


## Top Facts About the Amazon Rainforest!

Let's journey to the vast expanse of luscious forests, towering trees, and winding rivers in South America. Welcome to the Amazon Rainforest!

### Did you know...

- 10% of the world's known species live in the Amazon Rainforest.
- The electric eels who live here generate electrical charges of up to 600 volts.
- Over 20% of the world's oxygen is produced here.
- Loads of **scary creatures live here**, including jaguars, venomous snakes, and piranhas!
- **2.5 million** insects live here, including the **GIANT** titan beetle and the colourful jewelled caterpillar.

- It's home to around 500 indigenous tribes.
- The female catfish who live here can lay over 1,000 eggs at a time.
- The Amazon River is so huge that it **spans across** Ecuador, Bolivia, Brazil, Venezuela, Colombia, Guyana, Peru, French Guiana, and Suriname.
- The entire Amazon Rainforest is so big that the UK and Ireland would fit into it 17 times.
- Athlete Martin Strel swam the Amazon River and it took him 600 hours, over 60 days. That's two whole months of swimming, folks!

## Top Facts About Krakatoa!

Grab your bag and a strong pair of boots – we're heading to Indonesia in Southern Asia. We'll need to be careful, though. Watch out for the volcanic island of Krakatoa!

### Did you know...



Krakatoa erupted in 1883, and the blast was so strong that it triggered huge tsunamis and completely destroyed **165** villages.



The explosion created the **loudest** sound ever recorded in history.



The blast blew **two-thirds** of the island away.



The volcano is **still active** today, although it's nowhere near as violent as it used to be.



The geothermal energy produced from the **1883** explosion has attracted lots of wildlife who enjoy living in the warmer waters.



One type of creature that loves the warm waters is the **yellow tang fish**. It likes to live amongst the reefs, lagoons, and tropical coral.



**Green chromis fish** enjoy living in the warmer waters of Krakatoa, too. They like to swim about in large shoals so that they feel safer from predators.



**Bannerfish** are often found around Krakatoa, and they're most well-known for their beautiful black and white stripes. They're so famous they've even got lots of different names, like 'the false moorish idol' and 'the pennant butterflyfish'.



**Batfish** love Krakatoa's waters, too. An unusual creature, this fish walks around on the seabed on its own fins.



**The blue damselfish**, also found in Krakatoa's waters, can live up to 100 metres below the surface.




### Top Facts About Lake Malawi!

Pack your hat, your swimming costume, and a bottle of suncream, because it's time to board a flight to Africa! Here we can dive straight into one of the world's longest lakes – Lake Malawi.

### Did you know...

- The lake is **706 metres** deep, making it the sixth-deepest lake in the world.
- Its shoreline is **930 metres** long; that's two-and-a-half times as tall as the Empire State Building!
- It's home to more species of **fish** than any other lake in the world.
- There are hundreds of species of **cichlids** living here.
- Cichlids are famous for evolving quickly, with over 1,000 new species evolving over the past **13,000 to 100,000 years**.

- Some cichlids are tiny, growing to just **3.4cm** in length just two-and-a-half times the size of a Tic Tac.
- Sadly, water pollution, climate change, and overfishing are all **threatening** the lake.
- **Thousands** of animals call it home, including hippopotamuses, Nile crocodiles, and fish eagles.
- The lake is always warm and popular for keen snorkelers and swimmers, with temperatures of **74-85°F** all year round.


